

ORDER APPEALS FOR FRANK.

B'rith Sholom, with 50,000 Members, Urges Executive Clemency.

HARTFORD, Conn., June 1.—At the final session today of the United States Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of B'rith Sholom, an influential Jewish organization, a resolution was unanimously adopted advising Governor John M. Slaton of Georgia that 50,000 members of the society join with other bodies in asking him to commute the sentence of Leo M. Frank to imprisonment, so that if his innocence is later established the fair name of Georgia may remain unstained.

Another resolution, presented by Judge Aaron J. Levy of New York and adopted by the Grand Lodge, provides for the establishment of a Jewish National Congress, to which all Jewish societies shall send delegates for the discussion and improvement of conditions affecting the Jews in this country.

SINGERS IN WAR PROTEST.

Saengerbund Opposes Munition Shipments and Prohibition.

The first business of the Northeastern Saengerbund yesterday was to approve a resolution adopted by the Federation of Singers of Philadelphia and forwarded to President Wilson protesting against the export of arms and ammunition to the nations at war in Europe.

After the convention had decided upon Baltimore as the city for the next saengerfest, in 1918, a resolution was adopted asking the co-operation of other saengerbunds against the "illogical and unreasonable prohibition movement going on in the United States."

The four-day song festival in the Thirteenth Regiment Armory, Brooklyn, ended last night with the contest for the "Kaiser prize," a trophy presented by the German Emperor. The contestants were the Brooklyn Saengerbund, Williamsburg Saengerbund, and Arion Society of Brooklyn, and the Junger Maennerchor of Scranton, Penn. The decision will be announced at the big picnic in Cypress Hills Park today.

The "Kaiser prize" song was the "Night Watch of the Tyroleans, 1810."

Fire-Damaged Tanker Towed In.

The oil tanker Standard, owned by the Standard Oil Company, which caught fire off Yucatan, Mexico, on May 18, arrived last night in tow of the tanker Bradford, and was taken to Tompkinsville. The stoke hold and engine room of the Standard were burned out, and she was disabled when the Bradford picked her up.
